## Conferring of Honorary Degrees

#### HERMAN NORTHROP FRYE

to be Doctor of Letters

Your Honour, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Frye the lecturer, author, and broadcaster; Frye of the encyclopaedic mind, embracing music, art, architecture, politics, philosophy and religion; Frye the archangel of Criticism, was schooled in Moncton. And then New Brunswick lost him for ever to Ontario. There he became immured, with the fiery dedication that he brings to all his goals, in Victoria College in the University of Toronto. From Victoria he graduated—heading, as he had always headed, the Honours list in Philosophy and English. There followed an interval during which, after ordination in the United Church, he carried off first class honours at Oxford. To Victoria he then returned, to be lecturer in English and, in steady succession, Assistant Professor, Associate Professor, full Professor, Chairman of the Department, and finally, in 1959, Principal. An Eminent Victorian, this! But whereas his ebullient spirit, uncompromising frankness and a certain earthy humour, shatter that image of provincialism and hypocrisy, the function of Criticism yokes him among the Victorians with Matthew Arnold.

He is the leading authority on William Blake, and his first major publication, "Fearful Symmetry", gave him an international reputation. This has been confirmed and strengthened by the essays, articles, reviews, and books, that pour from his teeming and trenchant pen.

"Criticism", he postulates, "is to art what history is to action and philosophy to wisdom."

The complement of all creative work, she might in his revolutionary filing system be classified as both Sister and Midwife—and woe to fools who disagree!

Woe, indeed! since the destiny of this Encaenia has decreed for the Orator's next victims a pair calculated to test the hypothesis—a creator and a critic. Scrutinized by this Tyger burning bright, the task of presenting an artist and an art appraiser in the Fearful Symmetry demanded by Northrop Frye would scare a humble Classic, had not that Classic arrived by independent thinking at the master's own conclusions. For flattering though such consensus may be, it is, when in Frye's terrifying company, far, far more comfortable to do frying than be the fried.

#### SIR ALEC MARTIN

to be Doctor of Laws

Your Honour, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen:

In the name of herself, of this province, and of its capital, the University of New Brunswick acknowledges a debt to two men who, each in his own realm, have made their contribution to the Beaverbrook Gallery.

They represent those complementary elements without whose vital interplay all art must fail of its development, the creator and the critic.

The former is Goodridge Roberts, Sir Alec Martin the latter.

A connoisseur of universal repute, Sir Alec came out from England to advise and assist Lord Beaverbrook in the hanging of the paintings. Some may have glimpsed this robust and youthful Demiurge, who at seventy-six prefers to work in his shirt-sleeves, and who criticizes, when his criticism is provoked, in the roundest Anglo-Saxon.

He seems always to have been young, a critic and a lover of canvasses. He entered Christie's at the age of twelve and, as Managing Director for eighteen recent years of that world-famous house of art auctioneers, has superintended sales of over 15000 pictures annually with values over the years running into millions of pounds sterling.

To the preservation of all his nation's art treasures, their exhibition and, wherever possible, their circulation he has devoted the same wisdom and solid convictions that he brings to bear as Chairman of the Board of the Wallace Collection and as Governor and Guardian of the National Gallery of Ireland.

Three knighthoods have recognized the services, without inflating the ego, of this plain, blunt, (but altogether bewitching) man. A giant in the eyes of his world, the only cubits he will admit to adding are not those of fame to his own stature, but a single and very physical cubit to the ceiling, when already finished, of the Beaverbrook Gallery, which—to the consternation of donor, trustees, and architect—he advised raising by exactly that biblical measure. His shrewd, if devastating, aesthetics have brought this magnificent edifice one step nearer to perfection.

#### WILLIAM GOODRIDGE ROBERTS

to be Doctor of Laws

Your Honour, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen:

The name of Roberts is among Fredericton's greater glories; and among our lovelier surviving residences is the old Georgian rectory on Brunswick Street, which was the boyhood home of Theodore and Sir Charles, and nursed the infancy of Goodridge.

That glory is the richer in that the genius of a talented family, long manifested in literature, has been reincarnated in an artist. To his home, his father, his uncle, to his relative, Bliss Carman, he may indeed owe his deep yearning for the countryside. The voice is the Roberts voice—but the soul is the soul of Goodridge. Devoid of their elegiac tenderness, it has something profounder, starker and entirely his own. In his landscapes every brushstroke is a pulsation of his very heart, and the paint so many drops of its blood. The Canada that emerges is not Nature but the man himself; as untidy as she but as organized, fraught with a primeval gloom or bathed in "light that never was, on sea or land".

To paint is his whole life. Constitutionally unable to share painting with anything else, he has endured earlier days cramped by poverty or distracted by teaching. But, in this past year, while making one more gallant sacrifice, he may well have achieved his miracle. Endowed as the University's first resident artist, he has brought what he claims is fulfilment to himself, and what we know is inspiration to an entire community.

Concerning his art he has two more utterances. "I like" he says, "to paint young people . . . ones who have as yet retained their grace with a quality of both skeleton and the young flower about them, before they

have filled out and settled into solid citizens, or have become types, whether of success or failure."

The other is his ambition one day to join the great company of mural painters.

Mr President, let us crown this fruitful year by promising Goodridge Roberts the consummation of both these ambitions. Among our future buildings—and they will be many—let there be one, the noblest and most gracious of them all. And let it have a large and lofty expanse of white wall. The models, as you know, will not be lacking. Where else but on a University campus, our University campus, will Goodridge find such bands of young people that "have not yet filled out and settled into solid citizens, or have become types, whether of success or failure"?

This, surely, is to invite a masterpiece!

### ARTHUR SCHLESINGER JR.

to be Doctor of Civil Law

Your Honour, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Professor of History, its active proponent and most eloquent recorder, Arthur Schlesinger does us the greater honour. A fighting Democrat, he has torn himself from his embattled party to address an audience across the border and aloof from the fray.

He is one of Harvard's brighter ornaments. His first masterpiece he had written while a Junior Fellow at his Alma Mater, and revised while on war service at Washington. Published in 1945, when he was only 28, "The Age of Jackson" won him the Pulitzer Prize and fame as an historian of the highest order. Three years ago he produced volume I of what promises to be the profoundest document to recent American history. Opinions may and do differ over the more subjective sections of his "The Age of Roosevelt", but critics and admirers unite in praise of its fine prologue, its unforgettable portraits, and the vivid etching of the two protagonists.

While still devouring Volume II, the world looks hungrily up for the third in this massive tetralogy. The author meanwhile practices with gusto what he has preached in his pages, relentlessly nudging democracy into action and the Democratic Party towards its goal. Through the slings and arrows of Press skirmishes and the inevitable slurs of a presidential campaign he batters his way to the fighting line wherever it lies.

For you, Professor Schlesinger, as for Senator Kennedy, our friend and neighbour, we have nothing but admiration. Whatever our personal alignments, we would be craven indeed did we not wish you both all power to your collective elbow, a fair fight in the coming election, and victory to the better man.

Masters — Black silk or stuff gown, falling below knee, with long sleeves with semi-circular cut bottom.

Doctors — A scarlet cloth robe, faced with silk of the same colour as the lining of the hood worn.

### HOODS

Each degree has its distinctive hood as follows:

B.A. — Black stuff bordered with white fur.

B.Sc. — (Arts) black stuff lined with scarlet silk bordered with white fur.

B.Sc. — (Applied) black stuff lined with green silk bordered with white fur.

B.C.L. — Pale blue silk bordered with white fur.

B.B.A. — Black stuff lined with light brown silk bordered with white fur.

B.T. — Black stuff lined with royal blue silk bordered with white fur.

B.P.E. — Black stuff lined with claret silk bordered with white fur.

B.Ed. — Black stuff lined with blue grey silk bordered with white fur.

M.A. — Black silk lined with crimson silk.

M.Sc. — (Arts) black silk lined with white silk bordered with scarlet.

M.Sc. — (Applied) black silk lined with white silk bordered with green.

M.Ed. — Black silk lined with blue grey silk bordered with crimson.

Ph.D. — Scarlet cloth with dark blue silk lining.

LL.D. — Scarlet cloth with pale pink silk lining.

D.Sc. — Scarlet cloth with white corded silk lining.

D.C.L. — Scarlet cloth with pale blue silk lining.

D.Litt. — Scarlet cloth with grey silk lining.
