THE HONORARY DEGREE RECIPIENT

(presented by Judith Buchanan, Campus Orator)

HENRIK ODD TONNING

It is customary for a university to honour persons who have achieved distinction, and have made lasting contributions to their society. Tonight this University so honors Henrik Odd Tonning, a physician, an educator, a scholar and an administrator.

With his family, a young Henrik Tonning immigrated to Canada from Norway, settling in Black's Harbour, New Brunswick. From thereon his life unfolded in such a way as to leave a mark on the social fabric of this province.

He graduated as a Doctor of Medicine from Dalhousie University in 1943. Although he subsequently furthered his medical education elsewhere, he remained knitted in many respects to Dalhousie University, later in his career even becoming an important member of the academic staff of that University.

Dr. Henrik Tonning came to be respected by his peers and his patients alike as a highly dedicated internal medicine specialist and rheumatologist. He ultimately gave more years to his practice than UNBSJ has had anniversaries. His energy was relentless as he pursued issues which were of the greatest professional importance to him - patient care, teaching activities and clinical research. He played a central and crucial role in the development of what has become a broad based Department of Medicine at the Saint John Regional Hospital. His energy also led to the educational relationships and programs between the Regional Hospital and the Department of Medicine of Dalhousie University. Due in part to these efforts, the Regional Hospital has become a well respected teaching hospital. He established the Rheumatic Disease Unit which now, as a provincial referral centre, continues to provide exemplary care for patients with musculoskeletal disorders.

Henrik Tonning has been described as a listener, a leader, and a visionary. He is known for his administrative skill and quiet diplomatic finesse. Indeed in 1982, his official retirement year, he was accorded the title of Man of the Year in Medicine by the Saint John Regional Hospital for his multiple contributions to the advancement of patient care, to medical education and "above all for his kindness, tolerance and optimism." Retirement, however, did not mark an end to his contributions to health care in New Brunswick. This evening the University of New Brunswick honours the achievements and the person of Henrik Odd Tonning, who I present to be Doctor of Science, honoris causa.

ACADEMIC DRESS

All graduates and members of the academic procession are attired in the basic elements of academic dress – the academic robe, hood and the mortar board or the Tudor hat. The dress worn by each participant depends upon the academic level attained, with special attire for the Bachelor level candidates, for the Master's and for the Doctorate. While tradition has indicated the style or cut of the academic attire, each university will amend certain details to suit its own particular tastes and traditions. Following is a guide to UNB's ceremonial dress.

GOWNS

Undergraduates	- Plain black stuff, sleeveless
Bachelors	- Black stuff falling below knee, with full sleeves reaching to the wrist and terminating in a point
Masters	- Black silk or stuff falling below knee, with long sleeves with semi-circular cut bottom
Doctors	- Scarlet cloth, faced with silk of the same colour as the lining of the hood worn

B.Sc.	- Black stuff lined with scarlet silk bordered with white fur
B.Sc. (Applied)	- Black stuff lined with green silk bordered with white fur
B.B.A.	- Black stuff lined with light brown silk bordered with white fur
B.N.	- Black stuff lined with salmon pink silk bordered with white fur
B.Ed.	- Black stuff lined with blue grey silk bordered with white fur
M.A.	- Black silk lined with crimson silk
M.Sc.	- Black silk lined with white bordered with scarlet
M.Sc. (Applied)	- Black silk lined with white silk bordered with green
M.Ed.	- Black silk lined with blue grey silk bordered with crimson
M.B.A.	- Black silk lined with white silk bordered with light brown
Ph.D.	- Scarlet cloth with dark blue silk lining
L.L.D.	- Scarlet cloth with pale pink silk lining
D.Sc.	- Scarlet cloth with white corded silk lining
D.C.L.	- Scarlet cloth with pale blue silk lining
D.Litt.	- Scarlet cloth with grey silk lining
