The use of Latin today is a symbol of our academic descent from those earliest universities of medieval Europe and a humble reminder that the search for truth is both ancient and new.

HONORARY DEGREE RECIPIENT

Harry Scott Stackhouse, *Doctor of Letters*

Harry Scott Stackhouse was born in Saint John, New Brunswick and is a graduate of Millidgeville North High School. While attending high school, he began his career in the hotel industry working at the former Admiral Beatty Hotel in King Square as a bellman, then night auditor.

Mr. Stackhouse is an accomplished industry veteran with 30 years of experience in the Canadian hospitality industry. He is President and Chief Executive Officer of Delta Hotels and Resorts, Canada's leading hotel management company. Regarded as both a coach and mentor, Mr. Stackhouse leads a team of over 8,000 colleagues and oversees a portfolio of 46 hotels and resorts with more than 13,000 guest rooms across Canada.

Harry Stackhouse began his relationship with the Delta brand 30 years ago in Vancouver, British Columbia as a front desk clerk at Delta's first hotel, the Delta Airport Inn. This role carved the way for him in assuming increasing responsibility throughout hotel operations in locations across Canada. He took on his first General Manager's assignment in Whistler, managing what was the company's first foray into the international resort business.

In 1995, Mr. Stackhouse took on the role of Regional Vice President for Atlantic Canada based in Halifax, and in 1997, the position expanded to include properties in Cuba, the Dominican Republic and Orlando, Florida. In 2000, he was appointed Senior Vice President of Operations at the company's corporate office. He became President of Delta Hotels in 2006, and in 2007, his role expanded with the additional responsibility of Chief Operating Officer. In 2009, he was appointed Chief Executive Officer.

Mr. Stackhouse is passionate about community involvement and has driven the development of the company's corporate social responsibility program, Delta Helps. He was instrumental in creating Delta's national partnership with Habitat for Humanity Canada, and the chain's national sustainability program, Delta Greens.

Mr. Stackhouse is an active member in industry affairs and has served in leadership roles for the Hotel Association of Canada, Canadian Tourism Commission and Whistler Tourism Association.

ABOUT THE CONVOCATION CEREMONY

The Convocation Procession

The word "convocation" means "calling together," and UNB's convocation is truly a gathering of all individuals who are part of the University – students, professors, administrators, staff, alumni, families and friends. The ceremony starts with the procession of students, special guests, faculty, members of the Senate and the Board of Governors, the honorary degree recipient, the President & Vice-Chancellor, the Chancellor and the Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick.

The Stage

All of the formalities around convocation take place on the stage. The stage is occupied by the Lieutenant-Governor, representatives of the Federal, Provincial and Municipal governments, the University's Chancellor, the President & Vice-Chancellor, members of the University's Board of Governors, University officials such as Vice-Presidents, Deans and Directors, University alumni, those holding emeritus status and the honorary degree recipient. The flags at the back of the stage represent the countries that are home to the international students currently studying at UNB Saint John. The banners hanging above the stage represent the various faculties and/or schools in which students may study at UNB Saint John.

Academic Dress

It is part of the ceremony to wear the academic dress of the institution. It is for this reason that all of the students wear the gown, hood and cap, as do most of the University's faculty and officials. At UNB Saint John, the University's alumni are also invited to wear their academic attire and join the procession.

The Ceremonial Mace

The mace symbolizes the authority of the University to award degrees. Introduced in 1996, UNB's ceremonial mace features an antique silver cup atop a wooden shaft. The George II two-handled cup was given to the University in 1995 by S.A.H. Bridge, the great-great-grandson of Sir Howard Douglas, Bart. Sir Howard, Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick from 1823 to 1831, was instrumental in gaining the University's Royal charter.

The shaft was created by New Brunswick artisan Michiel Oudemans. Crafted from butternut, a wood indigenous to the province, it features elements of the UNB coat of arms and symbols of New Brunswick: the University motto, *Sapere aude* (Dare to know); a book of learning; beavers (in honour of Lord Beaverbrook, the University's first modern-day Chancellor); a galley; fiddleheads; and Atlantic salmon.

The mace is carried in the procession by the University Secretary.

Governors

& Senators: It is our pleasure.

Orator: Most distinguished President, most noble Chancellor, all the University, I present to you these supplicants in the above mentioned faculties that they may be admitted to their proper degree of Master (Bachelor), each in his (her) own Faculty; and I testify that they, so far as all our statutes require, are fit and suitable.

President: I admit you to the degree of Master (Bachelor) in the University of New Brunswick.

ACADEMIC DRESS

All graduates and members of the academic procession are attired in the basic elements of academic dress – the academic robe, the hood, and the mortar board or Tudor hat. The dress worn by each participant depends upon the academic level attained, with special attire for Bachelors, Masters and Doctors. While tradition has indicated the style or cut of the academic attire, each university amends certain details to suit its particular tastes and traditions.

Following is a guide to UNB's ceremonial dress:

GOWNS

Undergraduates	Plain black stuff, sleeveless
Bachelors	Black stuff falling below knee, with full sleeves reaching to the wrist and terminating in a point
Masters	Black silk or stuff falling below knee, with long sleeves with semi-circular cut bottom
Doctors	Scarlet cloth, faced with silk of the same colour as the lining of the hood worn

B.Sc.	Black stuff lined with scarlet silk bordered with white fur
B.Sc. (Applied)	Black silk lined with green silk bordered with white fur

B.Ed.	Black stuff lined with blue grey silk bordered with white fur
